"Ah Wilderness" To Be Presented By Stage And Script

Berry Vause Takes Leading Role In Play

With Berry Vause, sophomore from Selma, in the leading role of Richard Miller, the Stage and Script will present "Ah, Wilderness!", stage and screen success, tonight in Howard Chapel. A second performance will be given for townspeople tomorrow night. Both performances will begin promptly at 8 o'clock according to Director Doris Holaworth.

Mrs. Holaworth also announced that the performance tonight will be the production for the student body and there will be no admission charged, but admission will be charged for the second performance.

The play is the first to be presented by the Stage and Script this year. It has been highly recommended by the critics.

George Jean Nathan says: "In 'Ah, Wilderness!' Eugene O'Neill has written what seems to me to be as tenderly understanding a retrospective comedy, as deeply human and heart-filled and sadly happy a play as the modern stage has offered us."

In the *New York Daily Mirror*: "The charm of it, the tenderness and the comfort that it offers. A blending so lovely and so compelling that one of us, unaccustomed to such abundance of delight at one time, left the playhouse filled to the throat, so deeply does the new play impress."

It is claimed that the play is partly autobiographical and that the character of Richard is much akin to O'Neill himself when he was a dreamy, romantic, boy in the home of his father and mother. In the play the commonplace of family life are lifted into the story. Tender, wistful, compassionate, are some of the words which describe the comedy.

"Ah, Wilderness!" takes the audience far from the theatre and shows them the intimacies of an average home in an average community.

Building Fund Drive Gets Student Response

The Building Fund Drive which is being backed by the students at Atlantic Christian College, has gotten under way in the past few weeks.

The drive is being conducted by Mr. Evans, who is in charge of the drive throughout the state and city as well as the college. In order for Atlantic Christian College to remain an accredited school, many needed improvements have to be made. An extensive building program has been planned which will include the building of a science building, a girls' dormitory, a library, the renovation of Kinsey Hall, and a Student Union building. The college has already some money toward this betterment of the school in endowments.

It has been announced that the building of the girls' dormitory will be the first to be built. Construction will probably start about April. Rough drafts for the plans for other buildings have been drawn up also. The student building is to be similar to the dining hall, with the exception of wings on each side. The building will house the different rooms for organizations, such as dramatics, publications, the school store, book store, a small chapel, and other gathering places.

The last report on the fund on the basis of the pledges made by the students was that there was a little over \$3,000 in the sum. At that time the official total had not been announced.

The drive is being carried out throughout the Disciple churches. It was begun with the students in hope that their being behind the program would help in bringing in more money from the town and other communities.

The money for the fund can be paid in cash or it can be pledged and paid as the person wishes to over a period of two years.

Workers were named and were given students with whom to work in order to contact each student in the school individually. Contributions were made both individually and organizationally. The purpose in the personal contact was to get the support of each student on the campus.

In selecting students to be recommended, the campus nominating committee are asked to consider outstanding effort and accomplishment in academic work, extracurricular activities, and service to the school. During the school year, certified awards are presented to all students selected. In connection with the honor program, a placement service is provided through which members may be recommended for employment.

This year's selections comprise an impressive group of student leaders drawn from nearly every college activity.

Marguerite Noe, a Wilsonian and major in English, is president of the Golden Knot Honor Society, president of the Senior class, Associate Editor of the Collegiate, and secretary of Delta Sigma Sorority.
