Since the time for the elections is too near to look into the possibilities of organized parties, the students will have to handle the problems as best they can under the present system.

When time for the elections come, it will be the personal responsibility of each and every student on the campus to vote for the candidate of his or her choice. Take into consideration the character of the person for whom you vote. Ask yourself whether or not that person is worthy your vote. Does that person have the interest of the student at heart? Is he a leader? Or is he representing a special group on the campus?

Everyone deserves a free election. This year will be a milestone along the way to a system of fair play. Each student must do his part as an individual.


