\$150,000 Goal Set For Drive Wilson People Urged To Help

Atlantic Christian College moves forward in its effort to build new buildings and improve old ones. The excavation has been completed on the site of the girls' old dormitory, and construction will begin in a few days and continue without any let-up. A new library will follow the completion of the girls' dormitory. Plans have been drawn up for this building, and funds for the construction of this much needed addition have already been allocated.

Dr. Hilley announces that in all probability the library building will be located adjacent to Kinsey Hall joined by an arcade and facing Lee Street and Whitehead Avenue.

The third phase of the building plan calls for complete renovation of Kinsey Hall into a modern building which will serve as the Administration Building. Here will be located the offices and classrooms.

These three phases of the building program are the immediate aims and needs of the college. A science building, student activity building, infirmary and others are needed and will be provided as soon as possible. Such an extensive building program requires a huge sum of money in order to be carried out, and the administration hopes work can continue without let-up.

Several representative groups have been speaking and making broadcasts from Station WGTM preparing for the big money-raising campaign to be sponsored this month on November 15-30. It is known that Mr. Ira C. Evans of Atlanta, Georgia will return to Wilson to be director of the entire campaign. He was here last year doing similar work and made the drive a successful one. He will arrive in a few days to prepare for the initial opening of the big two-weeks drive. The tentative building program calls for \$150,000. It is hoped that approximately \$125,000 can be obtained in aid around Wilson during this campaign.

Many friends of the college have pledged certain amounts of money to the college building fund, and the Wilson Campaign. (Continued on Page Four)

Loftin, Mizelle Attend Forum

During a three day period, extending from November 11th through the 13th, the Harriet Elliot Social Science Forum met at W. C. U. N. C. to discuss the economic aspects of the world today. Atlantic Christian College was represented by Elmer Loftin and Gladys Mizelle.

The names of the speakers invited to the forum included such noted social scientists of today as Max Lerner, a former editor of PM and the "Nation", and Edwin G. Nourse, Economist and Chairman of the Council of Economic Advisors to the President. Lerner was optimistic in saying that he thought that there was no imminent danger of war between the U. S. and Russia because neither is prepared for war nor can either afford a war. Nourse, the President's economic advisor, constantly presented the over-all economic picture, leaving comment to the other speakers. It was brought out that Russia is not worried about armament as much as she is maintaining the strength of communism in the world.

The three day program included roundtable and panel discussions such as "Threat to Freedom and Security: War and Depression", and "How Can Economic Security Be Provided".

Ornithologist Lectures Here

CARL W. BECKHEISTER, noted conservationist and ornithologist, lectured and presented moving pictures to the college and townspeople on November 9, 1948.

The college and townspeople of Wilson were interested, amazed and thrilled when Carl W. Beckheister, Vice-President of the National Audubon Society spoke and showed moving pictures of wild bird and plant life in Howard Chapel on November 9th at 2 P. M.

The Chapel was darkened with material from the old blackboards and a large beaded screen made the pictures stand out in almost perfect relief. Mr. Beckheister explained and commented on the pictures as they appeared on the "silver screen". Many of these pictures were taken from within "blinds" and with a telephoto lens which made it seem as if one could actually touch the bird with the hand. Often the photographer had to wait in one of the cramped "blinds" for hours, even days to catch the shy wild bird in a place where it could be photographed. These lovely pictures in color bring to many people a close-up view of beautiful creatures in our midst that they possibly would not see in a whole lifetime otherwise.

Mr. Beckheister brought out vividly how habitat is so closely associated with the preservation of birds, other animals and plants that make life pleasant, even possible in some instances. These moving pictures bring a message, in delightful form, that will help us all in taking care of the wonderful heritage of natural resources that is ours if we take care of them.

Christians Hold Annual Meeting

The North Carolina Christian Missionary Convention of the Disciples of Christ, held its annual convention at the Broad Street Christian Church in New Bern, North Carolina November 10-12, 1948.
