When Coach Spangler takes his Bulldog cagers over to Eastern Carolina Teachers' College Saturday night, his charges will be putting out their best efforts to extend a string of four athletic victories over their arch rivals from Greenville. Since the baseball season of 1948, the Pirates have gone down in defeat in two baseball contests; in football last fall and in the first basketball game played between the two schools this season. This is probably the largest string of wins the local Bulldogs have ever enjoyed over the Pirates. With Charlie Moye and Jack Everton back in the line-up the Bulldogs will have to be at their best to hang on to "Bohunkus". Moye was praised very highly by the North Carolina State Mentor, Everette Case, when his team met E. C. T. C. in a pre-season practice game.

Atlantic Christian will also have a boy on the floor that is an almost certain all-conference man this year in Paul Glazer. A junior, Glazer has been a standout all year on the North State Conference hardwood and at the time of this writing is the fifth highest scorer in the conference. Jack Allsbrook, Rocky Mount's contribution to the Bulldog's Cagers, has also enjoyed a fine year and is also included in the Big Ten Scorers in the conference.

The Spanglermen have their eyes on the tournament which starts at Elkin soon. The A. C. C. team has come a long way uphill since taking a 66-33 drubbing at the hands of Appalachian in their initial conference game just before Christmas and might well be the dark horse team of the fast approaching tourney.

With touches of Spring in the air, much of the talk about the campus concerns baseball. With two all-conference standouts back on hand in Sparky McCaskill and J. D. Thorne, Atlantic Christian is expected to again be one of the top teams in the circuit. Coach Carl Blythe will make his debut as head mentor of this sport.

Speaking again of E. C. T. C., an announcement came from their athletic department recently to the effect that they had signed Bill Dole, the popular Fayetteville coach, as head coach of football at that school. He succeeds Jim Johnson who has guided the destinies of the E. C. T. C. grid eleven for the past several years.

Coach Bob Spangler is expecting a large turnout of boys for spring football practice which is scheduled to get underway soon. Everyone with the exception of Lefty Helmer and John Goff are expected to be on hand to form the nucleus of next fall's squad.

A powerful Lenoir Rhyne handed the local A. C. C. Bulldogs a 58-57 defeat on the local court Monday night for a North State Conference victory. It was a close battle all the way, but the cagers from the West were just a little too much for the Bulldogs.

Pacing the way for the locals was Captain Paul Glazer who bagged a total of 23 points to take individual scoring honors for the night. Close on his heels was Wilson's Bull Newsome, now playing for Lenoir Rhyne, who tallied many times during the night.

With the score at 58-55 in the closing minutes of the game, ACC tried vainly to rack up the necessary winning points. Foul shots were taken out on the side with hopes of gaining a victory, but the Western five held the AC cagers. With only a minute remaining in the game, Heater netted two more points to boost the score. With time running out, the locals still had hopes of a win, but the final whistle sounded before they could fulfill their hopes.

Charles Heater, reserve guard for ACC, played a bang up game as he went on to tally a total of 14 points for the night. Allsbrook got three, B. Tart four, Stott five, Sugg three, and Brown five, and Captain Paul Glazer tossed in 23.

Saturday night, ACC travels to E. C. T. C. in Greenville for a conference tilt with the Pirates.
