ACC People Are Publishing Works

With homecoming preparations well underway, the play about to be presented and various and sundry activities in the air it's hard to keep from feeling especially ACC oriented this week. So, we looked in the library catalog under the appropriate subject heading just to see what our ACC students, faculty and alumni have been producing in the way of the written word. Some of the items we found were typescripts but were student works of such quality as to justify including them in the library's permanent collection.

Last year one of our alumni, Mr. Milton King published a collection of poems, mostly on religious themes, called ANVIL KNELLS. The blurb on the dust jacket informs us that Mr. King graduated in 1954, that he served as a senior marshal and was voted the most intellectual boy in the graduating class. Those of you who knew him at ACC should find this collection of considerable interest.

Another alum, Mrs. Ruby P. Schackelford had a volume of poems published the same year called DREAMER'S WINE. Many of the selections deal with the teacher and the love of teaching. These poems are quite positive, fresh and occasionally very beautiful. The

biographical information states that Mrs. Schackelford began teaching in Saratoga school and has since then been a teacher of English in Wilson County high schools and at Atlantic Christian College.

In 1956 Griffith A. Hamlin wrote an article for the North Carolina Historical Review entitled EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES OF THE DISCIPLES OF CHRIST IN NORTH CAROLINA 1852 - 1902. Some of this material leads up to the establishment of ACC and should be of interest for historical background. The library has had the reprint bound and cataloged separately so that it will be readily available to those concerned. More recently Dr. Hamlin has had published THE OLD TESTAMENT; ITS INTENT AND CONTENT.

So far, faculty works in the collection are limited to the productions of our dear Dr. C. H. Hamlin. His listed works are: LOBBYISTS AND LOBBYING IN THE NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE; NINETY BITS OF NORTH CAROLINA BIOGRAPHY; and a brief autobiographical sketch entitled A SCRAP BOOK OF REFLECTIONS. We look forward to another creative outburst any day now.

Our student works have dealt

with academic subjects and the titles fairly well describe their contents: A PROGRAM OF HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION FOR ATLANTIC CHRISTIAN COLLEGE by Clyde Deans; STUDY OF SELECED NURSING SCHOOL CURRICULA IN NORH CAROLINA by Priscilla Ballance; THE REPUBLICAN PARTY IN NORTH CAROLINA by Arthur Bishop; VASCULAR PLANTS OF WILSON COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA by James Matthews and THE EFFECT CERTAIN TEMPERAURES HAVE ON PLANARIA - DOROHCEPHALA AND THEIR BILITY TO REGEERTE by Raymond Tissot. Another item which will interest those more inclined toward the literary can be found in the ACC vertical file under LITTLE REVIEW 1958. This product of the creative writing class includes prose and poetry by Ellen Dennis, Sanford Peele, Anne Nelson, Ernest Price, Kenneth Roberts, Cecilia Wong, Wilma Hairr, Martha Noel, James P. Moskos, Warren McDevitt and David Blackwood.

No, we are not forgetting our good Dr. Ware but his activities have been so prolific that we must reserve that for another time.

Sculpture Show Now On Display

A show of 10 works of sculpture by Eugene Langford of Roanoke Rapids, is now on display in the Atlantic Christian College Art Gallery.

Russel W. Arnold, Director of the Gallery, said today that the display will be on show through Sunday. He said one of the pieces is of concrete, two are of plaster, one is of metal and stained

glass, and the others are of metal. The works are abstract and abstract-expressionistic in manner and range from the partially recognizable to the completely abstract, Mr. Arnold said.

Mr. Langford uses a welded metal process which is highly representative of the modern industrialized civilization, Arnold pointed out. "In this sense his work is reminiscent of that done by David Hare, David Smith, Semour Lipton and other outstanding contemporary American sculptors, but he has been able to develop a unique approach of his own," Mr. Arnold said.

Mr. Langford is also a painter, though he has concentrated on sculpture in the past several years.
