# Adams To Boom Senator Program Fall Semester

Jeff Adams, president-elect of the Cooperative Association, has released his victory statements and some immediate presidential plans.

Interviewed by a Collegiate reporter, Adams made the following statements. "I express appreciation and thanks for the wonderful support and cooperation of my fellow students during the campaign. I think it was a very good campaign and one that took much time, effort, and faith to win.

"I had," Adams continued, "very strong competition in this race from a very capable person who has shown his capability in other positions; however, I am enthusiastically encouraged by your faith in me in electing me for this office."

When asked about plans concerning his administration, Adams emphasized he will live up to the platform presented in his campaign speech. He intends to present the proposed student senator plan at the first Executive Board meeting after his installation. This will be done in order to determine the opinion of the new Board concerning the plan.

Adams said he would like, if possible, to bring up this proposal before the entire association sometime this semester, but expressed

doubt that time will permit such. He does, however, desire to lay groundwork this spring for initiation of the plan next fall.

In addition to the senator system, he plans to promote the six points of his "program of awareness" as outlined in his campaign.

Adams expressed his continued interest in the student union phase of his platform and said he will have some additional ideas on this issue by the end of this school year, if possible.

When asked to what he credits his victory, Jeff replied he believes "people's confidence and faith are very instrumental in determining an election." He attributes his success to students' confidence and faith in him and to the outstanding organization and interest of those who worked on his campaign.

The turn-out at the polls for this presidential election has been described as a new voting record for this school.

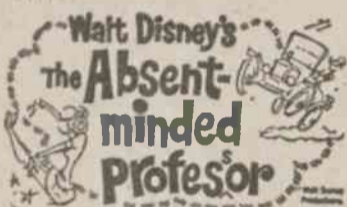
