## Mrs. Holsworth **Honored By Club** At Career End

Last night was the end of an era at Atlantic Christian College. The curtain fell on Mrs. Doris Holsworth's final drama production at the college - "Hedda Gabler."

Mrs. Holsworth, known to members of Stage and Script as "Duchess," is scheduled to leave in June and join the Peace Corps. She has been at ACC as a member of the English faculty for the past 15 years. In this time, she had directed some 75 plays for Stage and Script and countless outside projects.

at the close of the performance last night, Bob Lindley presented Mrs. Holsworth with a volume of bound letters collected from Stage and Script members for the past 15 years.

The dedication was printed on back of the program and was titled "To Our Director."

It read as follows:

With this production of 'Hedda Gabler' an era comes to a close. Our director, Mrs. Holsworth, is retiring in June and is joining the Peace
