Thad Eure Urges Young Democrats To Support Party

"The college age is the period when minds are being fertilized" Thad Eure told Young Democrats on the Atlantic Christian College campus last Thursday, April 26.

The Secretary of State went on to do some fertilizing of his own. His theme was party loyalty and the importance of party affiliation.

"To vote for the man rather than the party is impossible," Eure told the small group most of whom were members of the ACC Young Democrats Club. "The man must be affiliated with a political party. Political parties, after all, have always and always will administer government."

Eure urged the Young Democrats to study the history of both parties, not just their own, and to choose the party with which they are most in agreement.

Getting down to basics, the Secretary explained to the group, "The people we have chosen to administer our Government in this state and the United States are Democrats and it is even called a Democratic administration. If the party which opposed the Democratic candidates were in control of the government it would be called a Republican administration."

The first North Carolina Shakespeare Festival, sponsored by Stage and Script and the English Department, will be inaugurated next Wednesday night, May 8, at 8:15, with a production of *Romeo and Juliet* on the terrace in front of the Classroom Building. This will be the first in a series of events continuing through Friday, May 10.

At 4:00 p.m. on Thursday, May 9, Dr. Henry Popkin, Shakespearean scholar and Associate Professor of English at New York University, will speak on Shakespeare in the assembly-room of the new Music Building.

Dr. Popkin, who has been on the faculties of Rutgers, Queens College, and Brandeis University, holds the doctoral degree from Harvard. He has contributed articles on the drama to *Saturday Review*, *Reporter*, *Commentary*, *Kenyon Review*, *Theater Arts*, *College English*, and other periodicals. At present he is covering the New York theater for the *London Times*. In June of this year,

Dr. Popkin will be a member of the United States delegation to the conference of the International Theater Institute in Warsaw, Poland.

A second performance of *Romeo and Juliet* will be given on Thursday night at 8:00 p.m. on the terrace.

On Friday afternoon, May 10, at 2:00 p.m. Mr. Forrest Covington, well-known ballad-singer from Burlington, North Carolina, will present a program of Elizabethan ballads and their modern derivatives. This program will be given in the Music Building.

More than five hundred high school students from Eastern North Carolina will come to the campus on Friday afternoon to see a matinee performance of *Romeo and Juliet* at 3:30 p.m.

The final performance of *Romeo and Juliet* will be at 8:15 p.m. on Friday night, May 10. This will bring the Festival to a close.

D. L. Warren Resigns Post Takes Position At Phillips

D. L. Warren, dean of students and instructor in education at Atlantic Christian College, has resigned his position with the college to accept a position as dean of students at Phillips University, Enid, Okla., according to an announcement by Dr. Arthur D. Wenger, ACC president.

Commenting on Warren's resignation, Dr. Wenger said, "Most noteworthy progress has been made in the college's division of student life affairs under Mr. Warren's able direction. This new strength and vitality in our student life program will be a great continuing asset to the college in the years ahead. All of us are deeply grateful to Mr. Warren for his dedicated service during his tenure here."

A native of Spray, N. C., he attended Leaksville High School. Following a six-year tour of duty with the U. S. Air Force, he attended Atlantic Christian College and graduated from Phillips University with the A. B. degree in religion in 1957.

He earned the M.A. degree in guidance and counseling from East Carolina College in 1962. He has served as dean of student at Atlantic Christian College since September 1960.

An ordained minister, Mr. Warren served as associate minister of the Gordon Street Christian Church in Kinston from June 1957 until August 1960, and has served as minister to the Southwest Christian Church, Kinston, since February 1961. He has been active in the youth work of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in the state of North Carolina and also served on the International Christian Fellowship executive committee. He was also instrumental in developing the Junior High Camping program of the Christian Church of North Carolina.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Warren of Spray, he is married to the former Miss Patsy Cravens of Enid, Okla. They have two daughters, Virginia and Nancy.

Warren's resignation will become effective as of Sept. 1.
