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Development Fund Approaching Goal

Atlantic Christian College's Development Program has exceeded the \$700,000 mark in its current campaign for a minimum goal of \$750,-900, according to Thomas J. Hackney Jr., of Wilson, general campaign chairman.

According to Hackney, some 1,361 individuals, foundations and corporations have made pledges and donations thus far amounting to \$704,410.33. Campaign statistics indicate that the largest single source of contributions has been the Wilson County area which total some \$497,795. Gifts amounting to \$146,-590 have come from the ACC Board of Trustees. Alumni of the college have given \$93,280, while contributions from students now attending
