Two Homecoming Floats On Weekend

Two fires interrupted the regular activities during ACC's Homecoming weekend. Both fires destroyed floats that had been part of the Homecoming parade on Saturday.

The first fire destroyed the Sigma Phi Epsilon float Saturday night. The fire broke out sometime during the Varsity - Alumni basketball game, and completely destroyed the float as well as the flatbed which supported the float. The Sig Ep float had won the "best overall float" award in the parade that morning.

The second fire destroyed the Tri Sigma float around 4:00 a.m. Monday morning. This float had received the award for the "best Sorority float."

Total damage was figured to be in the area of \$500 to \$600, and at this time officials are still investigating the case and no official action or arrests have been made up to now.

College officials expressed concern over the incident because of the damage involved, and the possible damage done to public relations. It was pointed out that much of the damage was done to private property, mainly the two flatbeds, which were barrowed for this special occasion.
