The festival is made up of southern folk artists who have made records, performed at Newport Folk Festival, Carnegie Hall, as sell as concert halls in

Included in the festival are the Rev. Pearly Brown, Alice and Hazel, Mable Hillery, The Blue Ridge Mountain Dancers, Michael Cooney and Mike Seeger.

Rev. Pearly Brown is a blind street singer from Americus, Georgia. He sings slave songs, hymns and spirituals in time with the music of his guitar which he plays bottleneck style. Ballads

Alice and Hazel, originally from West Virginia, sing unaccompanied ballads as well as stringed music from the South of the early twentieth century, accompanying themselves on autoharp, banjo and guitar. They have two albums out on Verve-Folkways

Mable Hillery is a blues sing-er in the best of the oletime style, recalling MaRainey and Bessie Smith. Miss Hillery, a Vanguard recording artist, is said to be the greatest female blues singer in the country to-
