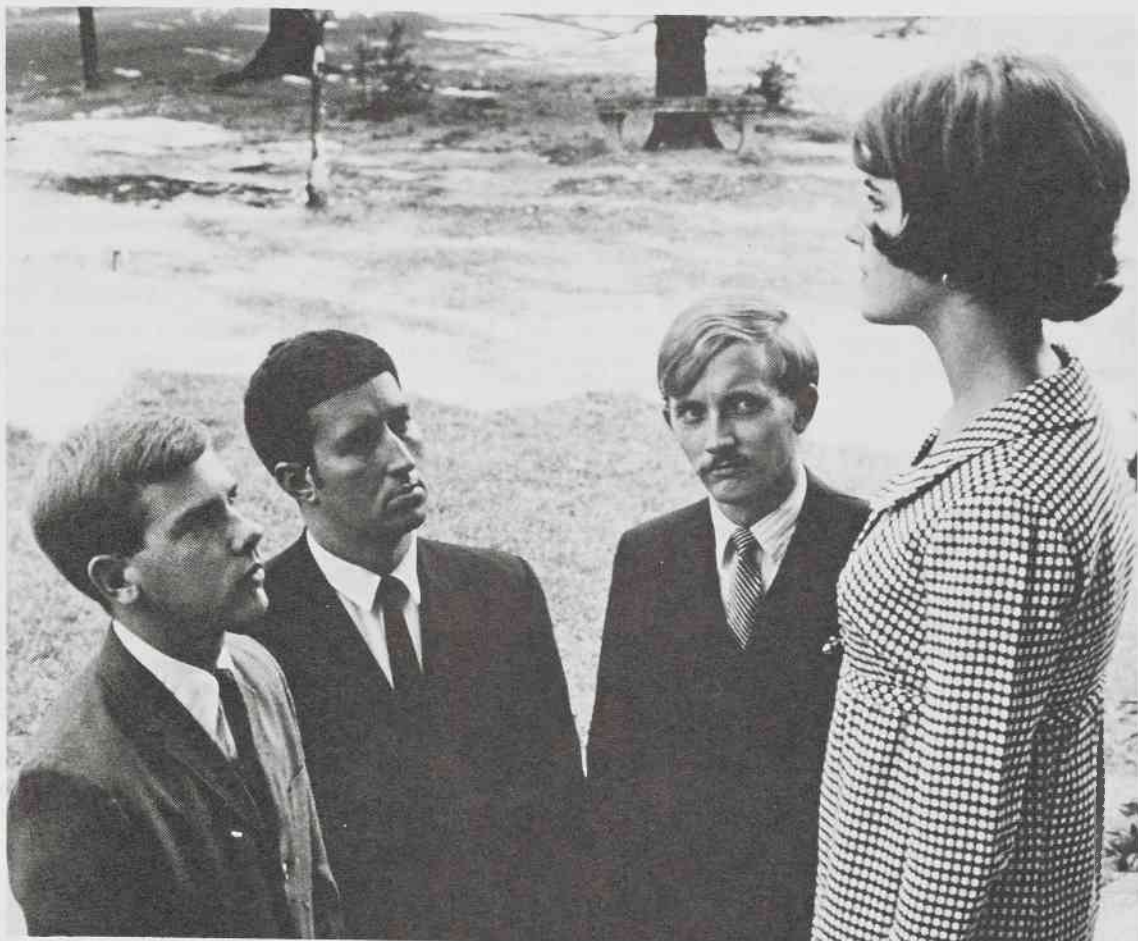

The Executive Board of the SGA, after much deliberation and contemplation, approved the 1968-69 budget during a regular meeting Oct. 2.

Paul Latta, Treasurer of the body, introduced the proposed budget and offered explanations as to various allotments. Steve Dollar, president of the junior class and chairman of the Entertainment Committee, informed the group of student desire for more big name entertainment at A. C. C.

He pointed out the fact that many organizations have a policy of giving banquets at the end of each year. The elimination of these parties and addition of the resulting funds to the Entertainment Fund would help their money situation, according to Dollar.

### Budget Changes

Several attempts were made to make the budget satisfactory to all concerned. They included taking money from the Exec Board, C.C.A. and Social Committee for the Entertainment Committee. Representatives from each of these groups tried to keep their organization from being cut. Finally, after numerous amendments, friendly amendments and amendments to the amendments, the budget was approved with one change. The \$500 intended for the social committee was given to the Entertainment Committee.

The social committee, with absolutely no funds, was placed in charge of the Homecoming dance. The committee could not constitutionally be eliminated so the members were invited to cooperate with the entertainment committee by the chairman.

The Day Student officers were permitted to present their proposed constitution to the organization. The motion to adjourn was unanimously accepted by the board.

Convocation will be held on Oct. 15 in Wilson Gymnasium. At this meeting, the Student Government Association will present the proposed '68-'69 budget for consideration by the student body.
