For the men who are interested in rushing this semester, Formal Rush for the Fraternities begins next Tuesday, October, 7, 1969.

In order to rush a freshman must have been in the upper 50 per cent of his graduating high school class and-or must have made 900 or better over-all on the S.A.T. A second semester freshman and upper classman must have a 2.00 over-all cumulative average. A transfer student who has a "C" average or better at his former institution is eligible to rush. A first semester freshman or transfer

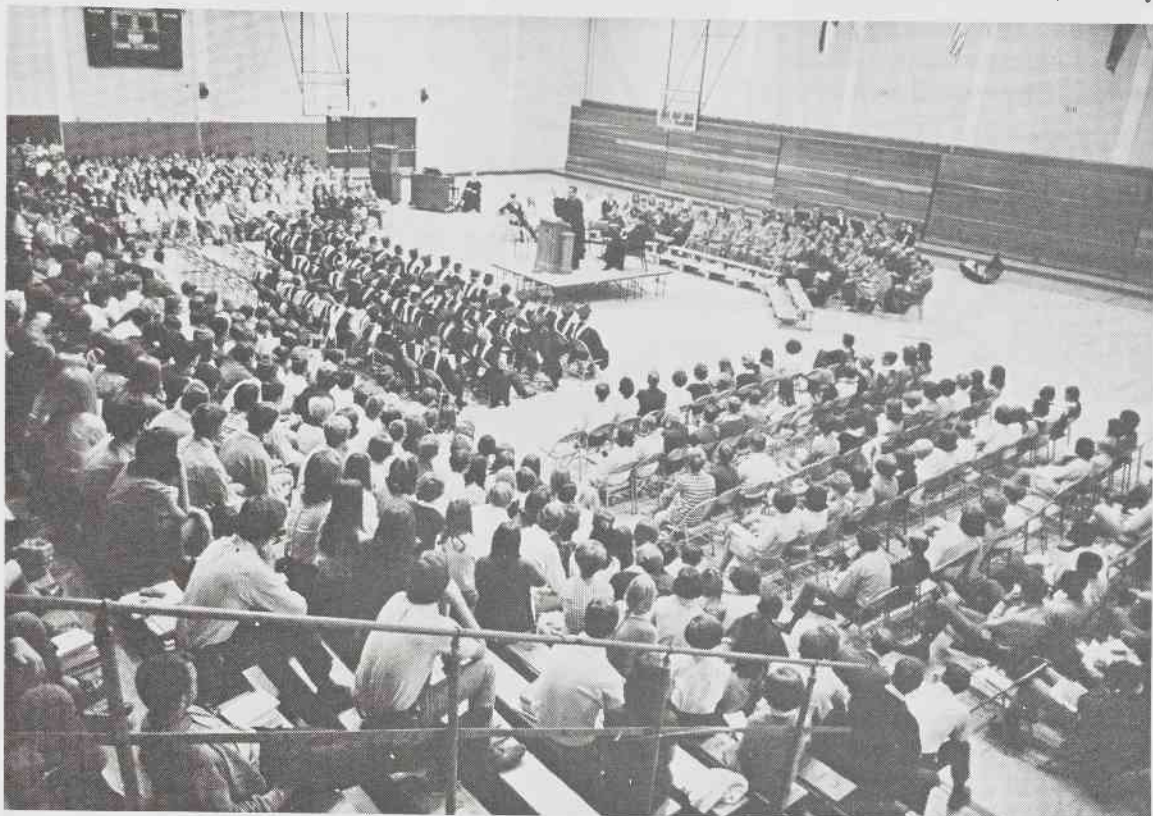
The A.C. Chorus then entertained with a short selection entitled, "Psalm 100" written by Mr. James Cobb, Chairman of the Music Department.

Chaplain Dan Hensley, in the presence of Dr. Wenger gave the annual Convocation address. Hensley centered his remarks around the topics of "What it is to be a man; and What type of man do you want to be?" At the outset he delineated what he contends to be the three types of contemporary men. "The organization man," said Hensley, is the man caught up in the rush of society, the man who has lost his identity, the man in short, the epitome of conformity.

The "hippie" is the second type of man. Hensley expressed his concern over the "bag of the hippies feel there is very little food in man and in the world. Hensley's third category was the "spaceman," "those caught up in the fancy of the world." constantly searching, probing, and investigating, capable of doing the impossible such as going to the moon.

Hensley then questioned the audience as to what type of man was Jesus? Was he an organization man, a hippie or a paceman? To some people Jesus was a type of hippie, in that the philosophies he taught and the ideals he preached were not always ascribed to by the majority of the populace. Jesus was also somewhat of a paceman said Hensley. Not in the sense of space travel but in regards to his constant probing and his capability of doing the impossible.

At this point Chaplain Hensley began to differentiate between two other types of men, the Galilee Man and the Man of Galilee (Jesus). The Galilee man was symbolized by decaying bones and a meaningless life, while the Man of Galilee represented a "spark of divinity in the dust of humanity." A spiritual man was aware of the presence of the divine in his life. The man of Galilee came to serve, while the

Hensley then alluded to sometimes irrelevancy of the present educational system. He said that too often we learn only second hand experiences, and that seldom do we ever attempt to seek our own experiences and learn from them. He emphasized that students must not be afraid to try something even at the risk of failing.
