Hensley Delivers 4ddress

It was a typical autumn day as udents paraded to the gym for

he official opening convocation f the 1969 fall semester. This vas the 68th such convocation o be held in A.C.'s history. The ym, although more crowded an usual, retained an air of ignity as the faculty processed 1, adorn in their academic

Dr. William Paulsell presided amver the convocation, and in his astoral prayer asked the tudents to, "develope a genuine or ense of curiosity and a strong and esire for intellectual growth. Ie closed by asking that the tudents and faculty, "...work ogether in the pursuit of nowledge."

The A.C. Chorus then en-Intertained with a short selection ntitled, "Psalm 100" written by albr. James Cobb, Chairman of he Music Department.

a Chaplain Dan Hensley, in the absence of Dr. Wenger gave the Innual Convocation address. anHensley centered his remarks olaround the topics of "What it is so be a man; and What type of aman do you want to be?" At the coutset he delineated wht he econtends to be the three types of montemporary men. porganization man," said Hensley, is the man caught up in the 'ush of society, the man who has ost his identity, he is in short, the epitome of conformity.

The "hippie" is the second Type of man. Hensley expressed nis concern over the "bag of the ippies feel there is very little good in man and in the world. Hensley's third category was the 'spaceman,' 'those caught up n the fancy of the world.' Constantly searching, probing, and investigating, capable of doing the impossible such as going to the moon.

Hensley then questioned the audience as to what type of man was Jesus? Was he an Organization man, a hippie or a spaceman? To some people Jesus was a type of hippie, in hat the philosophies he taught and the ideals he preached were not always ascribed to by the majority of the populace. For the men who are interested in rushing this semester, Formal Rush for the Fraternities begins next Tuesday, October, 7, 1969.

In order to rush a freshman must have been in the upper 50 per cent of his graduating high school class and-or must have made 900 or better over-all on the S.A.T. A second semester freshman and upper classman must have a 2.00 over-all cumulative average. A transfer student who has a "C" average or better at his former institution is eligible to rush. A first semester freshman or transfer

student who maintained a "C" average for 12 semester hours during summer school is also eligible to rush.

There will be informal 'smokers' held at the Delta Sigma Phi House, 804 W. Nash, and at the Sigma Phi Epsilon House, 701 W. Nash, from 7:00 until 10:00 P.M. On Thursday night, October 9, informal smokers will be held at the Alpha Sigma Phi House, 902 W. Gold, and the Sigma Pi House, 810 W. Gold from 7:00 until 10:00 P.M. These smokers will give the rushee a chance to meet as many fraternity men as possible and visit each house.

On Tuesday, October 14 and Thursday, October 16, informal smokers will be held at all four fraternity houses from 7:00 until 10:00 P.M. Formal invitations will be sent to the rushee for the smokers on Thursday, October

The bids to prospective pledges will be distributed in the Student Center from 12 noon until 5:00 P.M. on Monday, October 20. Each rushee must return his bids, both accepted or rejected, to the Dean of Men's Office before 5:00 P.M. Wednesday, October 22.

A "Quiet Period" will be observed from 12 noon, Monday

until 5:00 P.M., Wednesday. No fraternity man can speak to a rushee until he pins on a fraternity ribbon.

The sororities will have Initial Rush Parties Friday, October 10. All female rushees are divided into three groups for the purpose of attending the parties given by the sororities. The parties will be held Friday from 5:00 until 7:45 P.M. Delta Zeta will be in the parlor of Harper Hall, Phi Mu in Hardy Alumni Hall, and Sigma Sigma Sigma in the Vance Street House. 
