FNP Program Inaugurated

A family nurse practitioner program has been inaugurated at Atlantic Christian College through its Department of Nursing, according to an announcement by Dr. Arthur D. Wenger, president of the college.

The new program was developed through a joint effort of the college, the Area Health Education Center, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and Edgecombe General Hospital in Tarboro.

A family nurse practitioner (FNP) is a practitioner who is prepared to make independent judgments and to assume principle responsibility for primary health care of individuals and families in organized services. She assumes major professional responsibility for decision-making in relation to health needs.

She works collaboratively with physicians and other members of the health team in the delivery of health services to individuals and families. Her practice is community oriented, related to needs, concerns, and priorities of the consumers.

To qualify for the program, candidates must be registered nurses. They will spend 12-18 months in training in the Atlantic Christian program. They will be trained for assumption of responsibility for specific tasks involved in well-child and well-adult care; the diagnosis and treatment of minor medical problems; the care of minor injuries; long term continuing care of specific chronic diseases, such as hypertension, diabetes mellitus, rheumatoid arthritis, etc.; and recognition and classification of medical emergencies. Special stipends will be available for FNP trainees.

The program will primarily be funded through a grant from the Kate B. Reynolds Foundation to Edgecombe General Hospital, and by the Area Health Education Center at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Both Atlantic Christian and Edgecombe General Hospital are in Region L., Council of Governments.

Original guidelines call for the program to be conducted by an educational institution in order to receive licensure. The FNP program at Atlantic Christian College will use the basic FNP program at UNC as a model with variation as needed to fit the situation. The resources of the UNC School of Medicine and School of Nursing, in the form of consultant service, will be at the disposal of Atlantic Christian in planning and inaugurating the program.
