Choir Featured

The Atlantic Christian College Choir was featured at a recent statewide meeting of the N. C. Music Teachers Association convention held at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Music sung by the choir was by ACC composers who wrote especially for the group. The first piece, "Progress Desolation," for choir, piano, xylophone and tympani, was composed by J. Ross Albert, its director. The number portrays the desolation caused by progress by describing the final stages of a crumbling stone farmhouse before it gives itself up to complete desolation.

The second piece, "Phonemes," by Marvin Lamb, instructor in music at the college, used vocal sounds unlike those usually referred to as singing. The sounds were combined to show that the gap between musical sense and word sense is variable in the same way as is the gap between sounds and phones.

"Mass for these forgotten times," was the third piece. The mass was commissioned by the state and national offices of the association and was composed by Dr. William Duckworth, formerly of the ACC music faculty. The mass was entitled, "Kyrie, Gloria, Credo, Sanctus and Benedictus and Agnus Dei," to be sung by the ACC Choir. The mass combines the rhythmic flow and modality of Gregorian chant with chance tonal clusters and rhythms of contemporary times. The resulting textures create a feeling of potential for antiquity that faces the styles of today.

Following the concert, Dr. Duckworth was presented the Commission Award by Dr. Eugene Crobb, Dean of Music at Florida Atlantic University, who represented the Music Teachers National Association. Dr. Duckworth is currently a faculty member at Bucknell University.

system, and has been called the "foremost neurological problem of our time." In MS, the protective covering of the nerve fibers called the myelin sheath, deteriorates forming scar tissue so that nerve impulses do not always get through to activate muscles to perform their tasks properly. Impulses controlling several or all functions such as seeing, speaking, walking, and balances may be partially or completely blocked.

MS may bring total disability, but does not always. Remission or temporary relief from symptoms can be of short duration such as 2-3 days and has been known to last for years. Research is seeking the cause of these spontaneous improvements not only in the hope that they can be induced, but also with the realization that the key to the whole disease process may lie in this phenomenon.

The disease strikes mainly those in the prime of life — between the ages of 20-40, more frequently in women than in men, particularly those in higher socioeconomic groups. For some unknown reason, the disease is more prevalent in the colder rather than the warmer climates, although no area of the world is completely free of MS.

The main focus of the Circle K Club is to raise money to help pay for research in multiple sclerosis, a disease that strikes people our age. Plans are in the making for the Second Annual walkathon to be held November 10, 1973. Anyone who wishes to walk or wishes to sponsor a student is very welcome to do so. Circle K is also planning a door-to-door canvass of Wilson on November 16 and 17, and a collection at Parkwood on November 17.
