Lecture Scheduled

Dr. David E. Whisnant, lecturer on American music will deliver a lecture — demonstration on the topic, "Hillbillies and Revolutionairies: Contrary Traditions in Appalachian Music," on Jan. 22, at 10 a.m., in the choral room of Hackney Music Building at Atlantic Christian College.

Dr. Whisnant received his graduate training in American literature and history at Duke University. He has taught at the University of Illinois and for the past five years has been doing research and writing on Appalachian history, politics and culture.

His articles have appeared in the "New South," "Centennial Review," "Journal of Higher Education," "Soundings," "People's Appalachia," "Journal of Social History," and elsewhere. He is currently writing a book on Appalachian development and serving as consultant to the Southern Regional Council and the Smithsonian Institution's American Folklife Program.

The program is expected to last until noon. The lecture is open to the public. There will be no admission charge.
