## Shingleton To Speak

Dr. William W. Shingleton, Director of the Duke Comprehensive Cancer Center and professor of surgery, Duke University Medical Center will be the featured speaker at Atlantic Christian College's 79th Annual Commencement to be held here, Sunday, May 10, at 2:30 pm.

A native of Wilson, he was graduated summa cum laude from Atlantic Christian in 1939.

He was named the college's 1981 Alumnus of the Year. He received the M.D. degree from the Bowman Gray School of Medicine, Wake Forest University in 1943 and completed his residence in surgery at the Duke University Medical Center in 1950.

Shingleton became director of the Duke Comprehensive Cancer Center in 1971. He joined the staff of Duke University Medical Center as an associate professor of surgery in 1951; served as assistant professor of surgery, 1952-57; as associate professor of surgery, 1957-59; and was named professor of surgery in 1959. He was appointed chief of the General Surgery Division at the medical center in 1964, and professor of cancer research in 1979.

He is a member of numerous professional organizations on the state and national level including the Association of American Cancer Institutes of which he was president in 1977 and chairman of the board in 1978. Shingleton is director of the Clinical Cancer Education Program at the Duke University Medical Center and a member of the board of directors of the North Carolina Division of the American Cancer Society. He is a member of Alpha Omega Alpha, Honorary Medical Fraternity.
