## Youthgrants Available

The Youthgrants Program of the National Endowment for the Humanities is alive and well and will once again offer a limited number of awards to young people in their teens and twenties to pursue non-credit, out-of-classroom research projects in the humanities. Receipt deadlines for preliminary narratives for projects asking for more than \$2,500 is Oct. 15. The deadline for receipt of completed application forms is Nov. 16., and funded projects begin the following May.

Some examples of college-

level projects funded in this highly competitive program are: an annotated exhibition of 20th century war-time "home-front" activities in Minnesota and Wisconsin; a complete historical survey, presentation and guidebook on a tradition-steeped small Florida coastal island; a collection and study of migrant worker border ballads in South Texas; and a film on a small Oregon town's innovative survival method—backyard gold-mining—during the Great Depression.
