## Student Senate Approves Budget

The Senate met Thursday, Oct. 15, to review the 1981-82 budget of the SGA. In presenting the budget, Stephan Dentzer, SGA treasurer, explained that the SGA budget had been cut about \$7,000 since last year.

Dentzer explained that the amount of money carried over from last year was relatively lower than in previous years. He also concluded that lower student enrollment has affected the amount of student enrollment fees allocated to the SGA budget this year.

The budget cuts have affected many organizations. Below is the 1981-82 budget that was approved by the SGA:
