Moffitt predicts that "by the

end of the spring semester, our actors will be competitive with every other drama program in this area." He is now recruiting actors for the Players.

His major problem may be posed by the structure of the Little Theatre which lacks fly spaces and wings and has only two lighting bars.

The new director's ambition is to produce and direct films. "Someday Greensboro will be able to support an independent film company," he says, and he hopes to be involved in this enterprise.
