Graduate and professional school fair



King explores writer's other half

Within *The Dark Half*, Stephen King creates the worst possible scenario that can happen to a novelist writing a series of books.

Writing under the pseudonym George Stark, Thaddeus Beaumont gives life to a merciless killing machine in a series of fictional novels.

During the course of his writing career with this serial killing individual, Beaumont begins to exemplify similar characteristics in his own life, scaring his wife and persuading himself to

put an end to the killing series.

Shortly after burying George Stark and starting a new writing career as himself, Beaumont and his wife discover that Stark is alive and refuses to be put to death; Stark is even willing to take Beaumont's place! Throughout his novels and short stories, Stephen King creates the most horrifying scenarios of the simplest situations, freeing an individual from the fear (having already experienced the worst) to move on to new things.
