Hugh Chatham was a visitor in the Card Room Saturday.

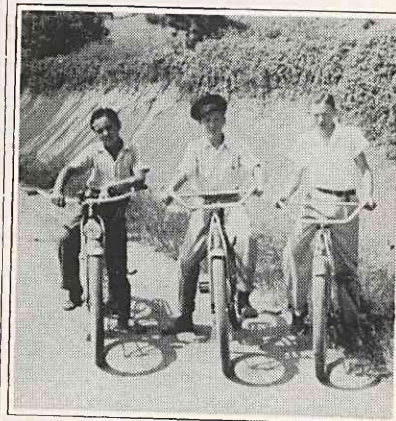
