

EMPLOYEES TO HELP BUILD HOSPITAL

Our employees are enthusiastically responding to the proposition made by Mr. Straus that the Company would match dollar for dollar any amount given by the employees to the Hospital Building Fund.

The Company has already given memberships in the Hospital Saving Association of North Carolina, Inc. to its employees without any cost to them, and has made the same benefits available to the families of employees at a nominal monthly fee. Now they say that if you want a modern up-to-date hospital, we will give just as much as you will toward building it. In the long run it would have been much cheaper on the Company to have built the hospital, and said you buy the hospital insurance. It was not the expense but the welfare of the employees that was of paramount concern. What more could we ask the Company to do except furnish us with a confining illness.

Employees are showing their appreciation of the interest the Company has taken by contributing generously to the Building Fund. All subscriptions are not yet in, but here are a few reports:

Down in the Pulp Mill, 11 men on Shift B--R. C. "Slim" Bullock's Shift - have subscribed \$45.00. In the Refiner Beater Room, 11 men on Shift A--Montville's Shift - have subscribed \$32.00. We had to look twice to believe the next one. Tom Allen's crew of 14 paper makers in the Machine Room, Shift B, came through with \$103.00.
