FRENCH EXPERTS LEAVE

On December 29th the bugle of the French Republic called to colors five members of the French group who have been with us for a period of eight months.

January 6th saw Messrs. Duca, R. Lebrun, Lenoir, Miguet and Viole on the train for New York accompanied by Madame Lebrun and Madame Duca.

From all indications, shrouded somewhat by the secrecy of the sailing date, our friends departed January 17th aboard the S/S "De Grasse".

Letters written by our friends from New York before sailing intimated that they were "in the army now", being guests of the French Government at a New York hotel and somewhat regimented. They stated, however, that they had no complaints to register and their few days in New York were full of interesting tours.

At this writing we have yet to receive confirmation of their safe arrival in France.

It is the wish of all at Ecusta that our friends reach home safely and that they do honor to the flag of democracy, the flag of freedom and of France.

ECUSTA OPERATING AT CAPACITY

On January 15th Ecusta Paper Corporation began operating on a 24 hour per day, seven days per week basis. The operating force has been divided into four shifts, each shift working 42 hours per week. This means that the mill is running at full capacity. The roar of the huge paper machines will not be silenced except for occasional repairs. Great sheets of fine, high quality white paper pour off the machine in continuous streams to later make wrappers for high quality cigarettes.

ATTENDANCE GOOD DESPITE COLD WAVE

The deep snow and sub-zero weather which has held this section in its grip, failed to daunt the courage of our employees. In spite of slipping roads and the pinching cold, most of the workers have reported for work on time. One man that we know of walked four miles to work and four miles back home each day - he hasn't been late yet. This takes real courage when the mercury is standing at 15 degrees below zero.
