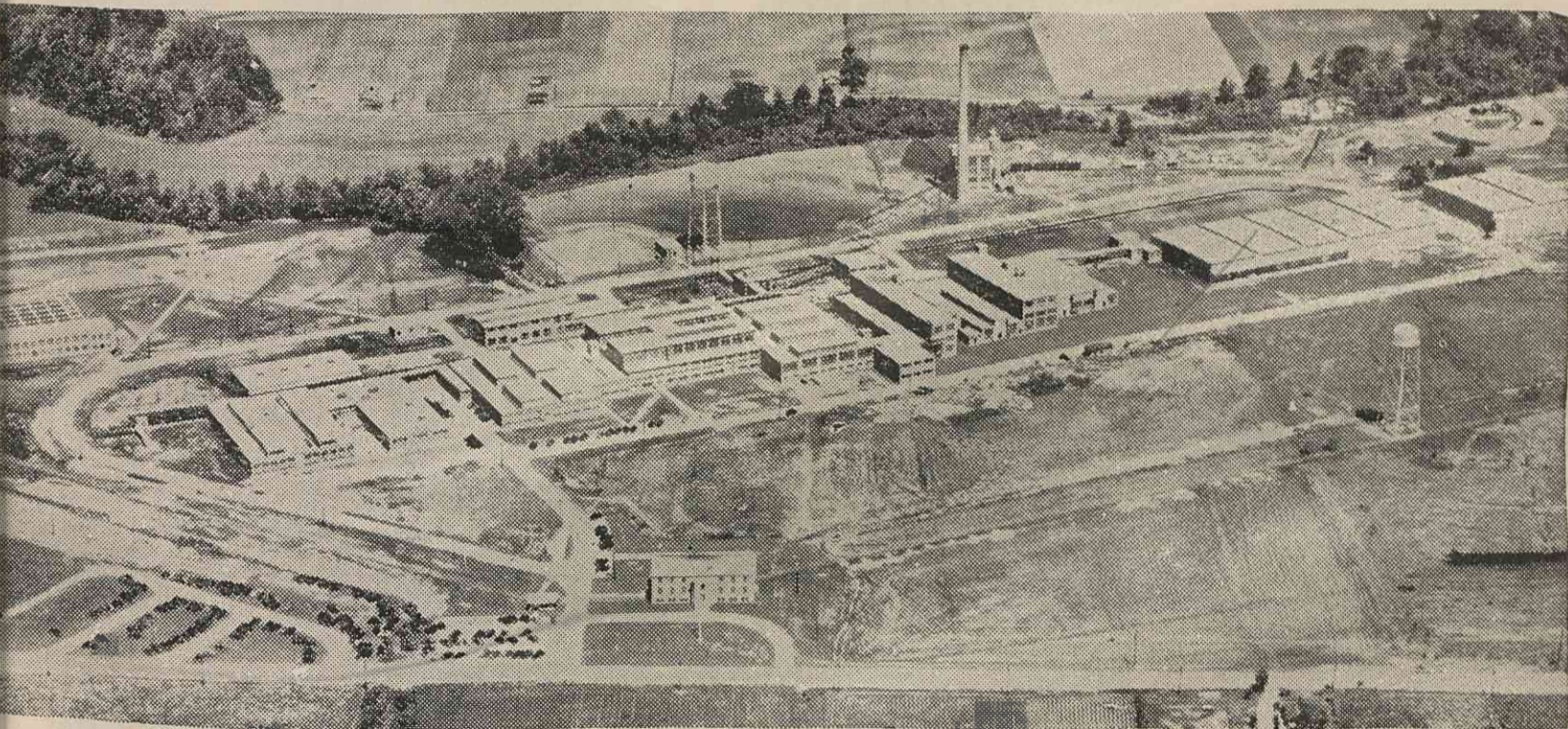


# AIRPLANE VIEW OF ECUSTA PAPER CORPORATION PLANT



## Expansion—Cont.

Along the west side of the original constructed units, and the envisaged larger plant which has proven itself successful than its originator and air connections will be completed, will operate as a single and continuous concern.

Call for having the additional operation by July 1, 1941, and will be trained by Ecusta experts in advance, and be ready to take over as soon as the plant is ready. Employees will be recruited from the vicinity surrounding Brevard.

The enlarged plant was made necessary, resident Straus said, in order to meet the demands which are being made and Ecusta corporation by importing cigarette manufacturing concerns from the country. Entire output of the plant which works on four shifts, and in this continuous operation, is sold to the executive said, and increased demands for the fine paper made at the Forest are such that full-time operation of the enlarged plant is assured for the future.

Ecusta manufacturers of cigarettes which pleased with the paper we are producing at Ecusta," Mr. Straus said, "our product has proven to the test that fine cigarette paper can be produced from flax instead of linen which were used in France before our plant began operations," the president added, "and the success that has resulted from our efforts justifies us in going forward with expansion."

The barbecue for both picnics was prepared and served under the supervision of Mr. Sam Allison, who is widely known as an expert in preparing barbecue. The drinks were cooled and served under the supervision of Mr. Lewis Osborne who operates the canteen on the Ecusta grounds.
