OVER 500 WORKERS REGISTER FOR DRAFT

Approximately 550 Ecusta employees between the ages of 21 and 36 have registered for selective military srvice. Of this number approximately 220 are single and 330 are married. It is estimated that approximately 500 of the employees registered in Transylvania County, while about 50 registered in the adjoining counties of Henderson and Buncombe.

The first quota for Transylvania County is 78 men. It is of course impossible to determine how many of these men will be from Ecusta until the questionnaires have been returned and the registrant classified by the Local Draft Board.

Questionnaires are being mailed out to registrants at the rate of about 50 per day. These questionnaires must be filled out and returned to the Draft Board within five days.
