The employee who was stricken with paralysis was paid the full amount of the policy. This amount, while small, can prove to be of great value in such an emergency.

> In addition to the life insurance, hospitalization insurance is carried on all employees. This too has been very helpful in many cases. During the first nine months that the hospitalization insurance has been in effect 52 employees have received hospitalization. These 52 employees spent 329 days in the hospitals, with practically all the expense paid by the insurance. This has meant a saving of approximately \$2,-000.00 for those who have found it necessary to go to the hospital. Besides the employees who have received this benefit, many of their dependents have received free hospitalization as a result of the arrangement made by the company for these dependents to be brought under the hospitalization plan.

Everyone is urged to read his policies carefully so he will know just what protection he has. Several have lost or misplaced their policies. If this has happened, the person should stop at the Personnel Office and fill out the requir-
