## OPEN OCTOBER 6

bowling season for the Inter-Department League will get under way Monday, October 6, 1941 at 8:00 p. m. All matches will be on a Monday of each week for 24 weeks.

In order to have practically equal teams, the Mill Department in the League, represented in this League, will be placed with other departments. This will allow departments which have a few bowlers to line up with another department which has only a few bowlers. The season will open with this understanding: the Finishing Department and both laboratories will join with the Inspection Department; the Machine Department will join with the Refining Department.

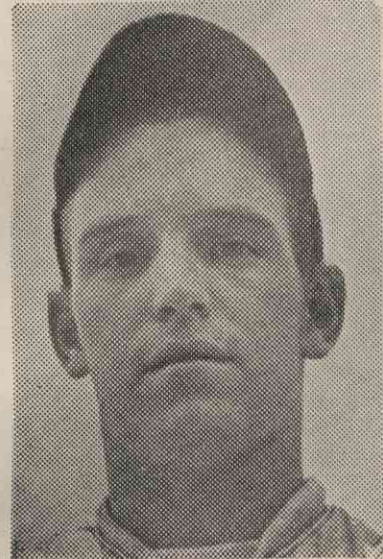
It was the vote of the majority to have a handicap with the League. This decision will tend to encourage the players who are anxious to learn to bowl. These handicaps will be changed every two weeks.

However, the captains decided it best to have each bowler pay five cents toward prize money. The prize money will be used to purchase trophies for the winning teams.
