

Charles Richard (Dick) Hedge, former employee, has been reported missing in the Near East. The parents of Dick, Mr. and Mrs. O. E. Hedge of Hendersonville, were notified by the War Department that he had been missing for more than a month. This was the first employee to be reported missing. Dick was employed by us in June, 1941, as an operator in the Gumming Department of Champagne. He remained on this job until December 24, 1941 when he left to join the United States Army. We understand that Mr. Hedge was a bombardier in the Air Corp and was located somewhere in the Near East. He was twenty-one years old and a graduate of Hendersonville high school and attended Western Carolina Teachers College for
