
#### **Oilers**

Unless you worked in the mill and had the opportunity to see for yourself you would not know that there is a large staff of men known as oilers whose job it is to see that all moving parts of the company's machinery are properly lubricated. The specific job of these oilers is to check all bearings and equipment and to oil and grease all machinery according to specific instructions. We have many different types of machinery and equipment here at Ecusta and many special types of lubricants are used. The oiler must see to it that the right kind and amount of lubricant is used for the proper application on each piece of equipment he services. There are eight oilers in this department and they are: Carl Hamby, DeWitt McCall, J. W. Britten, Ingomar McCall, O. B. Moffitt, Robert Merrill, James Maney and E. B. Sams.
