In fact McGraw, who was discharged from the navy in December, 1942, is very much alive and has been working every day this week at the plant.

Tuesday a news story appeared in The Asheville Citizen, with a Hendersonville date line, stating that McGraw died at 6 o'clock at his home in Hendersonville.

A complete list of survivors was given and all of the information in the story tallied exactly except the deceased part.

order to keep ourselves supplied in smokes, but it surely gives us a sense of pride to know that we are contributing so much directly to the war effort.

Ecustans are contributing other material ways. The supply of wood pulp, waste paper and other materials from which many papers are made has become extremely critical. Any relief that can be given by producing papers out of non-critical flax seed straw, saves that much more wood pulp for the manufacture of ammunition containers and other paper goods necessary to keep the boys overseas supplied with food, ammunition and fighting equipment. Since the shortage of wood pulp other materials has become crit-ical, Ecusta has broadened its field of paper production and is manufacturing such critical papers as carbonizing, manifold, air mail, pigeon mail and light weight text papers. Most of these papers ulti-mately are used by government or war agencies to fill the gap left by the scarcity of wood pulp pa-

Ecusta is also manufacturing condenser tissue, a paper used in the insulation of electrical equipment needed for the war. paper is so urgently needed that its manufacture was started at the request and encouragement of the War Production Board. The War Production Board has granted Ecusta permission to obtain a number of items of equipment to make it possible for us to produce more of such critically needed papers as are required for the war ef-

Ecusta converted some of its equipment in order to handle what we call the "Cotton Project" and a number of our employees are engaged in this work. For military reasons, the War department has requested that we do not divulge the details of this project at this

Practically all of the new papers developed are adaptable to civilian use, and these papers along with other papers are being planned for production after the war. This expansion into the broader fields of production, along with our very staple product of cigarette paper, assures loyal Ecustans of even more work when we finally can say that our war work has been well done.
