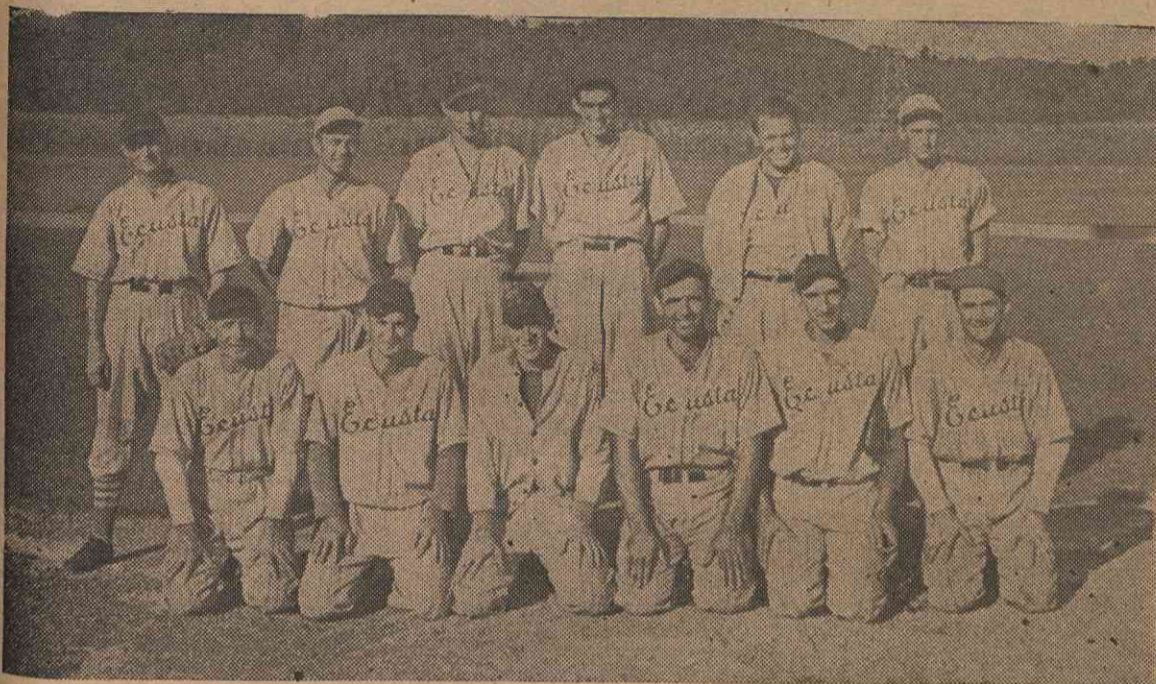

## FIRST GAMES ARE PLAYED; WOMEN TO START OCT. 4

Men Bowl Monday Nights; Women On Wednesday Nights. Teams Given

The 1944-1945 season of the Ecusta Bowling League opened on Wednesday night, September 27th, with six teams of the men's ten pin league competing. The opening meet was postponed from Monday to Wednesday in order that the work being done on the alleys could be completed.

All of the games will be played on the Centennial alleys in Brevard which have just been reconditioned and are in excellent shape for bowling.

There are seven teams in the men's league this season and the teams are: Refining Room, Control, Pulp Mill, Champagne, Machine Room, Office and Maintenance. In the girl's duck pin league there are six teams as follows: Office, Champagne Stars, Champagne Pin Setter's Delight, Finishing, Control and Endless Belt. ## FIVE ECUSTANS ARE AMONG CASUALTIES

Pvt. Jahue Cantrell Reported Dead; "Mac" Heaton Is Missing

The former Ecustans who are listed as dead are: Pvt. Jahue R. Cantrell, of Hendersonville, died in action in France, August 14th.

The missing: Cpl. Joseph A. Shook, son of Mrs. Julia M. Shook, of Tuckaseegee, since July 30, France.

Lieut. William "Mac" Heaton, son of William Heaton, of Hendersonville, missing in action over Germany since September 5th.

The wounded: Pfc. Allen P. Smith, Jr., son of Mrs. Gertrude H. Smith, of Flat Rock. (Place and date not specified).

David Lee Simms, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Simms, of Brevard, July 26, South Pacific area.

Pvt. Cantrell was killed in action in France, according to a message received by his wife. He was inducted into the Army a year ago at Fort Jackson, S. C. He went to England last June. He was last home on furlough in May. Prior to entering service he was employed at Ecusta.

First Lt. Heaton was shot down in a raid over Germany Sept. 5th as a pilot of a Thunderbolt; he had destroyed a number of Ger-

More Than Sixty Children Have Enrolled And Will Be Assigned Classes
