

Ecusta Offers New Service To Employees

A MODERN NEW VISUAL MACHINE HAS BEEN BOUGHT

Will Enable Employees To Check On Their Visual Skill And Test Their Eyes

Ecusta is fortunate to be among the few paper mills offering a new visual service to its employees through the introduction of Bausch and Lomb's new instrument called the Ortho-Rater. This new machine is the result of years of research by Bausch and Lomb in connection with the psychology department of Purdue University.

The purpose of this Occupational Vision program is threefold:

1.—To provide present employees with certain information regarding their visual skills and to let them know whether or not it would be to their advantage to go to a competent eye doctor of their own choice for advice.

2.—To make periodic checks of employee vision to determine whether or not the desirable visual skill is being maintained. Vision is a bodily function that is subject to change. If employees are advised periodically about their vision, corrective steps when advisable can be taken.

3.—To aid in the proper placement of new employees. Vision is an important factor in an individual's ability to perform a certain job, and it is desirable to have the new employee placed on the job for which his or her vision is best adapted.

Testing is done on an instrument known as the Ortho-Rater, a precision device developed and standardized by the Bausch and Lomb Optical company. It is considered outstanding for checking industrial visual skills. The testing system was worked out in collaboration with committees representing the National Associations of Ophthalmologists, Optometrists, and Opticians.

In preparation for the installation of this new equipment, the Company sent H. E. Newbury to Purdue University for a course of intensive training. This preparation is required of any company desiring the installation of the Ortho-Rater.

Plans are being made to give our present employees the benefit of an examination with this new equipment as a part of a coordinated program for the care of the eyes.

There has been fine cooperation on the part of all employees in all such programs, and a continuation of this fine spirit and the prospects of accomplishing much more in the future are anticipated.

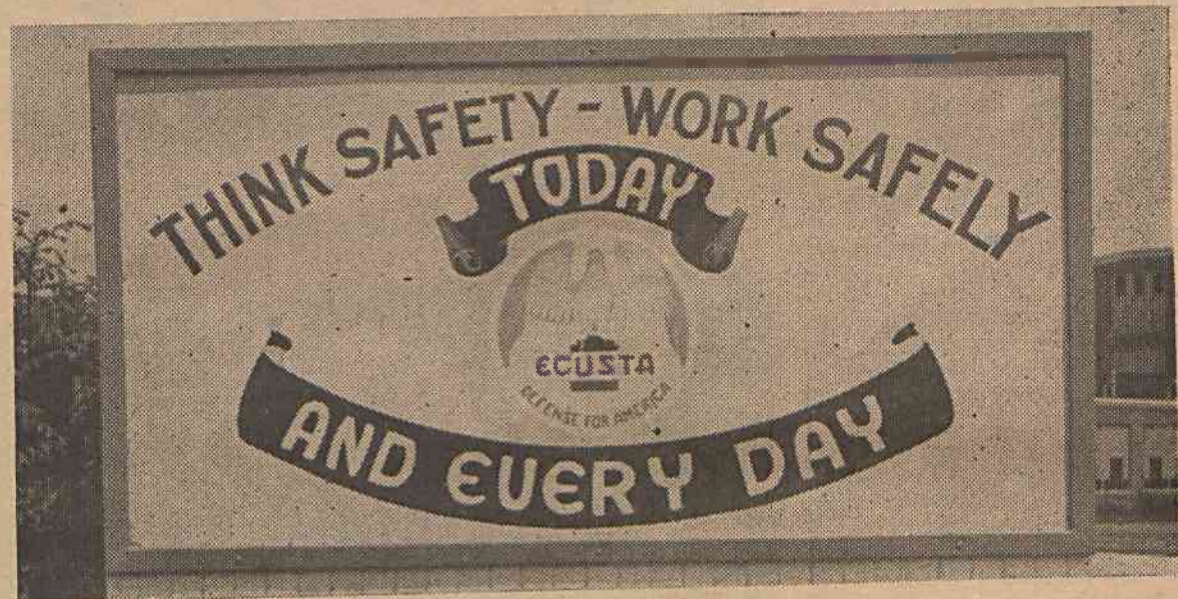
