MUST FILE TAX RETURNS BY 15TH.

Details Are Given. Assistance To Be Given By
Personnel Office.

We are calling the attention of employees to the fact that both federal and state tax returns must

be filed not later than March 15th.

The federal return is very simple provided the employee does not have more than \$100.00 income from sources other than wages and earns less than \$5,000.00. In this case the source of the so this case, this return may be filed by merely listing the dependents on the back of the statement of earnings which has been furnished you, signing it, and sending it to the Collector of Internal Rev. enue, Greensboro, N. C. If this procedure is followed, 10 per cent of the wages is automatically allowed for deductions. If an emlowed for deductions. If an employee has deductions which amount to more than 10 per cent of his wages, he should fill out a long form and take credit for these deductions.

The withholding certificate may be used for making a return only where wages are less than \$5,000. Every married man who had an income of more than \$2,000.00 and every woman who had an income of more than \$1,000.00 must file a state income tax return. There is only one form on which this return may be filed and the this return may be filed, and the husband and wife are not allowed to file joint returns.
