Stationed On Guam



Veteran May Get **Educational Leave From His Position**

Any veteran of our company, who is entitled to the educational benefits under the G. I. Bill of Rights and who desires to continue his education, may be granted a leave of absence for this purpose. It will be necessary for him to apply for this educational leave of absence and complete certain necessary records in the Personnel Department.

During a leave of absence for this purpose, seniority will not accumulate. The veteran will, however, be allowed to finish his course of instructions and return to the company without losing the seniority accumulated during active employment and active military service.

Many advantages are offered by the Government to veterans who desire to continue their education. They can go to college, high school, private school, or to specialized schools. To be eligible, a veteran must have served for at least 90 days since September 16, 1940, and must have had an honorable discharge. Even if a veteran served less than 90 days and was discharged because of a service connected injury or disability, he, also, will be entitled to the educational benefits. The active service of 90 days will entitle the veterans to one year of education. If he successfully completes his first year, he may then be entitled to additional years of education equal to the number of years of his active service in the Armed Forces. The Veterans' Administration will pay tuition costs, not to exceed \$500.00, and will also give the veterans an allowance of \$65.00 per month, if single, or \$90.00 per month, if married.
