You may be crazy about baseball, you may be able to rattle off the batting averages of every player in the major leagues, you may know all there is to know about every team from the Cards to "Dem Bums", but it's ten to one you don't know how the game

In colonial times, Americans played a game called "Rounders", a game that was similar in many respects to the present day baseball. Because of this similarity, "Rounders" was originally believed to be the first form of baseball, but it is now generally conceded that baseball started from a strictly American game named "One Old Cat", "Two Old Cat" or "Three Old Cat" and so on meaning the number of bases the batsmen had to touch before regaining home-plate.

From this crude method of "bat the ball, run and score", developed the game of "Town Ball" in which teams competed against other teams. The first Town Ball Club was organized in 1833 in Philadelphia and in 1839, from the rudiments of "Town Ball", Col. Abner Doubleday devised and named the game of baseball.

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At the time Col. Doubleday laid down his rules for baseball, the ball was larger than now and the pitcher was required to toss the ball or pitch with an underhand swing as in softball. No gloves were used and an ax handle made a perfectly suitable bat. But while the rules and equipment have changed with the times, Doubleday's fixture of base locations and distances between bases has never been changed.

Today, baseball, the American national game, is rapidly con-quering the world. In Canada, it is becoming more popular every year.
