BEACON IS HALF GAME AHEAD OF ECUSTA PLAYERS

Will Determine Second Place Nine. Won Three And Lost One In August

The Ecusta baseball team in the WNC Industrial league will travel to Swannanoa Saturday afternoon to play the strong Beacon Mills team in a scheduled league game which will determine the second place standing in the league. The Beacon nine is a half-game ahead of the Ecusta team and a victory by the locals will reverse the lead. Hazelwood remains in first place with 15 wins and one defeat.

Ecusta had a good average during August and won three ball games and lost only one.

The highlight game of the past month, and the season as well, was Ecusta upset over the league-leading Hazelwood nine here on the local field on the 17th. of August. Paced by the two-hit pitching of Grover Suttles, Alexander's boys shut-out the visitors, 6-0.

It was Ecusta's game all the way. In the first inning, Sams walked, Byrd singled and Alexander brought home the first run with a drive to leftfield. The visitors scored two runs in the first, one in the second, two in the third and the sixth run in the fourth. Orr and C. Morris led the batters with two hits out of four trips to the plate. Sams, Byrd, Misenerheim and Case all made timely hits when runs were needed.

Last Saturday afternoon Ecusta team forfeit when the Canton scheduled game. On the 10th., the locals lost a close one to Sayles coachery in Asheville by the score of 5 to 3. The ball game was all Sayles managed to drive across two runs in the ninth to come out victorious. Orr, Curry and Case were the leading hitters.

On August 3rd., Ecusta took a home-game from Green River before a large crowd by the same score of 5 to 3. "Knuckle-Ball" Morris was the big factor in the win with four hits out of five innings up. If your original discharge papers have been lost or destroyed, the Personnel Department will be glad to assist you in securing a certificate in lieu of discharge.
