The forms will be available at all United States post offices about October 1, and if obtainable, the Personnel Department will have these forms for you as soon as possible thereafter.

If your original discharge papers have been lost or destroyed, the Personnel Department will be glad to assist you in securing a certificate in lieu of discharge.
