The use of the "Liberty Bell" in this campaign has attracted an unusual amount of public interest, the results being that radio, television, newspapers, theatres and magazines will soon release a flood of advertising to create a nation-wide awareness of the purposes and goals of the drive. A considerable amount of the publicity will be
