of the manufacturing total, about 255,000, or 57 per cent, were textile workers.

In 1953 Transylvania County had 3,127 workers with a total of \$10,477,000 in wage payments.

Ecusta employees received about \$9,000,000 in wages in 1953.

*Covered employment refers to employees who are covered by the North Carolina Employment Security Law. In general, the Employment Security Law applies to establishments employing eight or more persons except when such establishments are government agencies or charitable organizations or interstate railroads.
