Another college year is well under way at Asheville-Biltmore. It promises to be one of the most signifcant in the history of the institution.



## Foster Speaks At Assembly

Robert Foster, Jr., of George Washington university, southeastern instructor of the C.C.U.N., addressed the A-B college student body on the subject, "The Purpose of the United Nations," in an assembly program Tuesday, Sept. 21, in the annex.

Mr. Foster explained what the purpose of the C.C.U.N. is, and illustrated how the chapter for this college will be formed. He emphasized that you must "know what you are selling" when becoming a member of the C.C.U.N., and that it was not a force but an arganization among nations.

A panel discussion on "How to be Happy Though in College" was conducted by Dean W. W. Hannaman following Mr. Foster's address. In the discussion, Dean Hannaman emphasized "doing something worthwhile" in making a person happy, and asked the student hody several questions

student body several questions. Miss Mary T. Miller gave the devotions, which were followed by announcements.
