## Graduate Work To Be Available In Summer School

Graduate or certificate credit will be available through the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina at the summer session of Asheville-Biltmore College it was announced today by Dr. Glenn L. Bushey, president of Asheville-Biltmore. According to Dr. Bushey, The Woman's College will send three of their faculty members to the campus of Asheville-Biltmore this summer. Miss Edith Huffman will offer a course in Remedial reading in a 12 year program from June 20 to July 1. Mr. J. A. Smith will give "Science in the 12 year program" from July 4 to July 15. And Mr. Herbert E. Vaughn, will teach Educational Guidance from July 18 to July 29. Each course will be two weeks in duration with classes held every week day from 8:30 to 12:30 under the workshop plan. This is the first time in its history that Asheville-Biltmore College has offered graduate or certificate credit through one of our state institutions.

The regular Summer Session of Asheville-Biltmore College will begin with registration on June 6 and will continue with a wide and varied curriculum through August 6. Many students will receive valuable training in regular college work during the two sessions offered. Asheville-Biltmore College is a standard Junior College, offering standard Junior College Credit. It is a member of the American Association of Junior Colleges, as well as the North Carolina College Conference, and is accredited by the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction and the State University of North Carolina.

During the last few weeks Dr. Bushey has also made a tour of approximately 15 high schools in Buncombe County, speaking on the subject, "Shall I Go to College?"
