A native of South Bend, Indiana, Hartman received his B. S. degree in physical education from Purdue, and the master of education degree from American University.


He has taught and coached high school basketball, football, and baseball in Jacksonville, Florida. During this time Hartman played on the Gibbs AAU basketball team for three years.
