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A-B Hoping For Earlier Accreditation

Asheville - Biltmore College can receive senior college accreditation this year, some 12 months earlier than previously expected, Dr. William E. Highnounced.

The earlier date was made possible because of a new policy adopted by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Previously, A-B would have had to wait until after graduation of three classes, although accreditation would be retroactive.

Dr. Charles B. Vail, associate executive secretary of the Southern Association's Commission on Colleges, wrote Dr. Highsmith that the earlier accreditation date was possible under a policy adopted by the association at its annual meeting.

"This policy applies to institutions in transition from junior to senior status and hence to Asheville-Biltmore," Dr. Vail wrote. A-B has had junior colaccreditation for many

"The new policy will permit Asheville - Biltmore College to gain accreditation as a senior institution in 1967," Dr. Vail said. "An evaluation will be necessary, of course, and we should make plans for an evaluation committee visit in the early

Although the policy of retroactive accreditation was discontinued, the earlier commitment to A-B will be honored and the accreditation, if gained on scheduled this year, will be retroactive to cover A-B's first class, graduated in June, 1966.
