One break-in and an attempted break-in in recent weeks have moved campus officials to take strong security measures on campus to prevent future thefts and attempted thefts. Dave Anders, manager of the campus radio station WUNF reported to THE RIDGERUNNER that the station was entered sometime between Christmas Day and New Years. Joyce Williams, manager of the Campus Bookstore, reported last week that a break-in was attempted

When asked about the possibility of someone having entered the Campus Store, she commented that it appeared that an attempt to enter the store was made but appeared to have been unsuccessful. A window near the rear door of the store was broken but it is believed that no one actually entered the store. She said that a theft could not have been determined unless a full inventory of the store was conducted and that such an inventory was not now planned.

Federal employment group to visit UNC-A on friday

This Friday, January 19, the UNC-A Placement Service will host the annual Federal Employment Outlet Program from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in the lobby of the Lipinsky Student Center.

The program is sponsored by the United States Civil Service Commission and the Raleigh area office which is co-ordinating the activity according to Acting Area Manager, Philip B. Belt. Bob Jamison, Senior Staffing Specialist for the Raleigh office will coordinate the events for the day.

This marks the first time that such a job placement program has come to the UNC-A campus. The commission feels that UNC-A is more centerally located then the previous location of the program and has of late become interested in liberal arts graduates.

The purpose of the program is to permit junior and senior students from the area's institutions of higher education an opportunity to learn what the various federal agencies have to offer in the way of career opportunities.

The various representatives of the agencies will not be taking applications for employment at this time, but will be offering information and procedures to follow in seeking a career with the federal government upon grad-

The following agencies will be represented here Friday: Bureau of Indian Affairs, Civil Service Commission, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, (Social Secruity Commission), Department of Interior (Blue Ridge Parkway), Environmental Protection Agency, Internal Revenue Service, Marine Corps Base, National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences, National Climatic Center, and the Veterans Administration Hospital.

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
