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Weekend Food Service Abolished

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14 Unsolved Murders in WNC

Searches Widen, Rewards Mount, But No Arrests

The number of unsolved slayings in the Asheville and Western North Carolina area has risen recently, and these brutal deaths, when added to others in recent memory, have by logic increased the number of killers who walk free.

The cases are as baffling and mysterious as they are numerous.

Virginia Marie Olson, the 19-year-old UNC-A sophomore from Lexington, was killed April 15 on a bright and sunny Sunday afternoon on a hill above University Gardens. The gardens were full of people that afternoon, yet no one apparently saw or heard one thing from the hill.

Sally Bell Moffitt, the 18-year-old Mars Hill College sophomore from High Point whose body was found near a heavily traveled highway near the quiet Baptist campus Oct. 12, died from a severe blow to her body which cracked a rib and sent it piercing through a pulmonary artery—a very mysterious death.

Two other recent slayings—both still unsolved—involve Glenn Z. Zachery, the 54-year-old Sheraton Motor Inn night clerk who was shot in the back at the Asheville motel on the night of Aug. 28, and the almost forgotten death of Lawrence Logan, the 35-year-old black man whose nude body was

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Lack of Use Cited As Reason

The food service program at the cafeteria and snack shop on weekends has been discontinued. This move was implemented on Nov. 3 due to the lack of use of the food service facilities on weekends.

Provisions have been made to furnish a car twice daily on Saturday and Sunday to transport students without transportation to a local restaurant within a two-mile radius. A car leaves Vance Hall at noon and at 5:30 p.m. and returns for the students at 1:30 and at 6:30 p.m.

According to a member of the security staff, only three students took advantage of the free transportation last weekend.

According to Mrs. Alice Wutschel, associate dean of students, the shutting down of the food service program on weekends was prompted by a lack of usage by dormitory students. It is reported that on the weekend prior to the discontinuation of the food service program on weekends that only \$26 worth of business was done.

Mrs. Wutschel cites the non-mandatory food service system and the usage of refrigerators by dorm students in their rooms as possible reasons for the low student usage of the food service program.

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
