2. The germ:

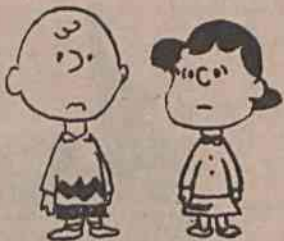
