



UNC-A should have a new classroom building by fall of 1979, in the North Carolina or 54 per cent.

UNC-A's Chancellor William E. Highsmith was "very pleased" with the passage of the bond issue. He said, "I would like

to express my gratitude to all of the people of Western North Carolina who helped in the campaign and who voted for us."

On the Second Floor

Political foes of Student Government President Randy Kindley last week thought for sure they had found the means for his demise. A March 18 form letter from testing, counseling, and advising was recently "discovered." The letter said Kindley's current classification is freshman and congradulated him on the progress he has made at UNC-A.

According to the Constitutional Amendment that was the cause of the massive controversy during Kindley's election, the S.G. President must be a sophomore by the time he takes office. A petition of formal charges was circulated and was to be presented to the student Senate for impeachment action. Subsequent checks with the Registrar's office have revealed Kindley's status as a sophomore.

WUNF-FM radio station manager Larry Warren said last week he is finally stepping down from the post he has held since 1974. The selection of a new manager is scheduled for mid April by the station's executive committee composed of faculty, students and administration. Warren said his desire to graduate and the fact that he is simply tired of managing the station are the reasons for his decision.

Production director and DJ Curt Wright appears to be Warren's likely successor. Chief engineer Kevin Douglass, probably the most qualified candidate for manager, is academically ineligable for the position.

Most people on the second floor of the student center were rather bewildered last week with Ramona Griffin's selection' as Ridgerunner editor for next year. Most of those now atfiliated with the paper have announced their refusal to work for Ms. Griffin.

Speculations are being made as to who will apply for the secondary staff positions. Ridgerunner editor applicant, S.G. Media Commissioner, and close Kindley advisor Randy Luquire is seen as a possible managing editor or business manager for next year.

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
