### **BILLY RESIGNS**

AP-Feb. 28-A tearful Billy Carter, under heavy fire recently from the media for his controversial behavior, today resigned as the President's brother. The news did not come entirely as a surprise, since the White House has been denying for days a rumor that Billy would step down.

The resignation came at nine o'clock yesterday morning, when Gerald Rafshoon delivered by hand Billy's personal letter to the President. At a news conference later in the day, the President said he had accepted the resignation "reluctantly." It is not known when the President will appoint a new brother, but several names have been mentioned as possible candidates. Informed sources high in the Administration say the selection process is well under way, and mention such prominent figures as Larry Flint, George Plimpton, and Willie Mays. Ruled out, however, were former Presidents Nixon and Ford, and potential primary adversary Jerry Brown. Rafshoon denied that pressure had been applied to Billy from within the administration, and characterized it as "a personal decision. He just didn't want to prolong the national agony any further," Rafshoon said. Billy Carter had little to say to reporters after his brief announcement from the steps of his Plains, Georgia home. "You aren't going to have Billy Carter to kick around anymore," he was quoted as muttering; "henceforth don't call me, I'll call you."
